It was a true mission impossible, which required sailing the treacherous Black Sea, convince the king Aeetes to hand over the Golden Fleece, and overcome the sleepless dragon who was guarding it... Jason succeeded in all tasks with a little help from the gods, especially goddess Hera who put a spell on Medea, a sorceress and a daughter to Aeetes. Medea ran away with Jason, which sparked a great pursuit led by Medea's brother Apsyrtus.

Jason and the Argonauts couldn't return home the same way they came, so they found an escape route on mystical paths, over the mouth of the river Dunav and its tributaries all the way to the northern Adriatic. While they were travelling, Apsyrtus had already settled in the northern Adriatic and made a pact with the islanders. Jason was ready to negotiate an honorable agreement, so he agreed to meet Apsyrtus near the temple of Artemis. It was a trap. Jason killed Apsyrtus and ranss away with Medea and the Golden Fleece, protected by a horrible storm that Hera sent to stop the Colchians in their pursuit. Fearing the king's rage, the Colchians remained on the islands. They called them Apsyrtides, the isles of Apsyrtus, to honour the Colchian prince.

#### MALI LOŠINJ/UMPINJAK

There is an unusual viewpoint at the top of Umpiljak Hill overlooking Mali Lošinj. The breathtaking view of islands and isleds surrounding you is accentuated by educational panels that bring out their stories. The first photographers of the 19th century knew that this was the place to take the best panoramic shot of Mali Lošinj.

#### **KULA-TOWER** Veli lošinj

The circular tower that irresistibly reminds of rook, swallowed by the houses of the port of Veli Lošinj was built by the locals as a defense against the pirates. Today it houses a small historical museum offering a wonderful view of the centre of Veli Lošinj from the top.



## ST. ANTHONY THE ABBOT

#### VELI LOŠIN.

Built on a rock perched above the entrance to the port, the parish church of Veli Lošinj resembles a fort. This makes entering the church more spectacular. The acoustics of the lavish Baroque interior, decorated by the local, well-off captains' families, are worthy of a great concert hall.

## 13. **ILOVIK CHANNEL**

The llovik Channel, 2.5 km in length and 300 m in width and protected from all winds, has always been a haven for many ships that were escaping the notorious storms on Kvarner, zigzagging through the labyrinth of islands and islets. Seeking military protection from the pirates, they moored at Fortica on St. Peter's Island, whose ruins can be seen today still.

# A A A A U U U U U SUSAK

Imagine a steep pyramid of the finest sand in the middle of the sea. That is the island of Susak. It was once covred with vineyards enclosed by reed (because there are no stones on the island), and the grapes and wine provided means to buy everything that was necessary – from stones to build houses to wool for their colourful folk costumes.

## POLJE

The big, flat, and only a few meters above the sea level, Polje (the field) near Unije on the eponymous island, appears somewhat surreal. A long time ago, the wheat danced in the wind, but today there's only tall grass, with a sheep's head popping out of it every so often. Polje served as an aiport for small planes until a few years ago.

The last functioning olive mill on Lošinj is not located in Ćunski by accident. It is precisely here that over the last decades the old olive groves were rebuilt and new ones planted. # HERITAGE, 18. HAND-OPERATED PIVOT BRIDGE

Traditional songs, dance, and local customs and skills have always been a part of Nerezine, not just something that is put on display for visitors' pleasure only. With the persistent sound of bellows, the locals continue to celebrate Muaj, a celebration of youth and spring, and their regatta of traditional wooden boats is something that can't be missed.

To shorten their trip, the Romans dug through Kavuada and artificially split the islands of Cres and Lošinj. The channel is so narrow and the bridge so small that most people don't even notice it, except twice a day when the bridge opens for passage of boats by manual operation. It is quick and efficient, thanks to hydraulics.

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#### DRINK WATER FROM THE FOUNTAIN

ALI LOŠINJ-TWO DOLPHINS

The Two Dolphins fountain was erected in 1960 to mark the opening of the water system in Mali Lošinj. The rainwater from the tanks has been replaced by the top-quality water of the Lake Vrana on the island of Cres, which still runs in every shower and tap on Lošinj. Have a good drink of this water, for its quality is better than any of those bottled waters.

#### **JGAPINE**– čikat-ambroz haračić

Lošinj is one of the most afforested islands on the Adriatic, however, it is not the work of nature, but Professor Haračić who started the afforestation of the island karst in 1886. In the first six years, half a million seedlings of Aleppo pine wre planted, of which 300,000 survived. A great deal of them has endured all the droughts, strong winds, and storms for over 130 years. Their imposing trunks rise high above footpaths through the forest and coastal promenades on Čikat, where the proud "green professor", a bronze statue of Ambroz Haračić, watches over them. Find your pine-tree and hold it tight; you will hold the very soul of Lošinj.

#### 13.HIKE ACROSS THE VELE SRAKANE ISLAND

#### 15. RING A BELL "FOR FAIR WINDS AND FOLLOWING SEA" OS PRÉCICA-SV. NIKOLA

Island of Lošinj resembles a big ship with the command bridge on Osoršćica, where from the eponymous peak "commands" St. Nicholas, the patron saint of sailors and travellers. The climb to this small, but very picturesque island mountain (588 m above sea level) is worthy of the captivating panoramic view of the island of Lošinj and the surrounding islands. At the St. Nicholas (Sv. Mikula) Peak, you will be welcomed with open doors to a small chapel that has been knocked down by storms so many times over centuries and rebuilt from scratch by the hard-working locals. There was a St. Nicholas monastery in the Middle Ages where the monks vowed to a solitary life. Enter the chapel; remember that we are all Travellers on the Sea of Life and ring the bell as hard as you can for "fair winds and following sea".

#### "HUNT" WITH ARTEMIS

HALMAC /TARZIC

Somewhere between Halmac and Taržić, in thick forests surrounding the calm meadows at the foot of Osoršćica, hide the remains of the temple of Artemis from the mythical search for the Golden Fleece. If a deer or a roe jump before you, or you see a – catch them with your camera.

# 18. **PET A MARTEN**

Osor is known for many bronze statues scattered around the town. They are all dedicated to music and musicians, except one which celebrates the marten. Its fur was used to pay taxes, and our currency carries its name today. Pet the bronze statue so that your leafy martens don't dash away from your pockets.

#### 17. DESCEND INTO "PANTHEON"

PUNTA KRIŽA-JAMINA SRED

Halfway between Osor and Punta Križa, west from the Vela straža Peak, in the middle of deserted flatlands where you can easily get lost (although the path is marked), there is an unusual cave where people have lived for thousands of years. Slide through the narrow passage and enter a miraculous space that resembles the Roman Pantheon.





# WITH THE LOCALS

There's no better way to discover our villages and people than attending the festivities that celebrate their patron saints – in Osor on St. Gaudentius day (1st June), Punta Križa on St. John's day (29th June), Ilovik on St. Peter and Paul's day (29th June), Nerezine on St. Mary Magdalen's day (22nd July), and Sveti Jakov on St. Joseph's day (25th July).

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# 1. 1 ISLAND! 2 ISLANDS! 3 ISLANDS?

Initially a single island, Cres and Lošinj were split by an artificial channel near Osor by the Romans. About 2,000 years later, a second channel was dug at the entry to Lošinj. Both bridges open twice a day and give way to the boats, like they always have.

#### SIZE IS RELATIVE

For a long time, Krk was considered the biggest island in the Adriatic, but recently, the island of Cres beat it for 0.5 km<sup>2</sup>. How did this happen? The coast on Cres is steeper, therefore, the rise of the sea level floods it. Veli (*big*) Lošinj, as you would guess, was bigger than Mali (*small*) Lošinj for a long time. It was, but it is no more. Why? Because of the port.

#### **ISLAND-VINEYARD**

In the late 19th century, phylloxera destroyed most of the Mediterranean vineyards, but Susak was spared because this pest could not propagate on the island's sandy soil. The demand for grapes and wine was huge, so the locals turned their island into a huge vineyard and got very rich.

#### "THE NORTHERNMOST

**SOUTH"** The 45th parallel north passes near the village of Vodice on the island of Cres and is halfway between the North Pole and the Equator. The entire Mediterranean is further to the south, but not the neighbouring island of Lošinj with its true Mediterranean climate. Thanks to its distance from the mainland and the strong effect of the sea, a plethora of plant species grow on the northern part of Lošinj (holm oak, myrtle, orange, lemon...). Pleasant in winter due to warm sea currents, refreshed in summer by a light breeze from the sea, always sunny and never too dry, Lošinj is a true Mediterranean island – the northernmost south of Europe. Regardless of the ongoing climate change, its own has remained mild and healing.



The big, deep, crystal clear lake in the middle of a dry island of Cres is a hydrological phenomenon. Its surface is around 13 m above the sea level, and the two connect somewhere deep (eels!). The lake is the main source of excellent potable water, so access to it is limited.

#### PARK-FOREST ČIKAT

130 years ago, Professor Ambroz Haračić sparked the afforestation of the barren surroundings of Mali Lošinj. In just 6 years, half a million seedlings of Aleppo pine were planted on the island. Most of them survived thanks to the local women who watered them during the early days. Today they make up the protected Park-forest Čikat.

#### 7. MAGRIŽ -IMMORTELLE (LAT. HELICHRYSUM ITALICUM)

Timid and inconspicuous greyish bush interspersed with green that imbues the island's karst with odour, blooms in summer in golden yellow flowers that never wilt. In 1908, Andrija Linardić Jr. from Martinšćica distilled the first immortelle essential oil, which is considered very valuable and carries healing properties.







# **SEA MEADOWS**

Dark patches on the turquoise sandy bottom of the waters around Lošinj are meadows of Mediterranean tapeweed (*lat. Posidonia oceanica*), a seagrass species among whose long leaves over a 100 different species of fish spawn, grow, feed, and live. Mediterranean tapeweed grows very slowly, over centuries in fact, and it is endangered due to illegal anchoring.

GRIFFON VULTURE FROM CRE\$

These magnificent birds that circle the sky above Cres in groups are called griffon vultures (*lat. Gyps fulvus*). Despite their size (wingspan up to 280 cm, height around 100 cm) they are harmless because they feed exclusively on carcass. They are rare and endangered, therefore, a very protected species.

11. CREEPY CRAWLIES

If you come across a snake on your walks on these islands, fear not. It most likely isn't a snake but a harmless legless lizard – a slowworm or a European glass lizard. Real snakes are not venomous, such as European ratsnake (*lat. Elaphe situla*), one of the most beautiful European snakes.

Bottlenose dolphins (*lat. Tursiops truncarus*) can be found in the entire Adriatic, but only those living around Lošinj do not migrate. A group of around 180 dophins permanently lives around these waters, so the scientists and lovers of the sea know them by their "names", that is, the marks on their dorsal fins. They love company; ship's engine noise not that much.



#### 12. **ST. GAUDENTIUS**

The patron saint of the islands of Cres and Lošinj is St. Gaudentius, the bishop of Osor and an ascetic from the 11th century. There are numerous legends around him, the most famous one being that he banished all venomous snakes from these islands. For that reason, he is always depicted with snakes and is considered the protector against poisonous snake bites.

### 13.THE THREE RISES AND FALLS OF THE CITY OF OSOR

Osor, the old capital of the islands of Cres and Lošinj, experienced its first rise in the ancient times. Although rich and well-fortified, it did not sustain the Saracen attacks in the 9th century that resulted in the city being looted and burned to the ground. Rebuilt on ancient ruins, Osor blossomed again under Croatian rule. After a long siege and robbery by the Genovese at the end of the 14th century, Osor was so badly destroyed that the Venetians rebuilt only a half of the city and built a new cathedral. The third rise was short-lived. The navigation routes changed so the ships didn't need to pass through its channel and port, and there was an outbreak of malaria. Osor was thus outworn.



#### 14. **ALDEBRANT PETRINA**

Whoever survives the stormy *bora* wind on Kvarner can sail the world. The skills of sailors from Lošinj was legendary, like the speed record set by Captain Aldebrant Petrina who, in 1906, sailed the route from Trieste to Chile, around the Cape of Good Hope, in only 94 days on his sailboat "Contessa Hilda".

#### 16. THE SAILBOATS OF LOŠINJ/ AGOSTINO STRAULINO

The locals say that "navigation is business, sailing is pleasure". At the end of the 19th century they turned a regular old pasara boat into a sailing speedster and competed in the Augusta Bay. Agostino Straulino, the legendary golden Olympian from Lošinj and later an Italian admiral, learnt his sailing skills precisely on this boat.

## THE SHIPBUILDERS OF LOŠINJ / **NIKOLA MARTINOLIĆ**

150 years ago, there were five shipyards in the big port of Mali Lošinj, where almost 250 ships were built in a span of around 30 years. Among them is the 60 m long full rigged ship (*nava*) "Imperatrice Elisabetta", the biggest sailboat in the Mediterranean, built in 1875 by the hands of the brilliant Nikola Martinolić.



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#### TYPICAL HOUSE ON LOŠINJ

The huge demand for wood in shipbuilding led to the lack of beams, which then made the locals turn the roofs of their houses upside down and create the original Lošinj house with short ridges and wide façades. The only decoration of these simple houses were creative chimneys and beautiful front gardens.

#### FIRST TOURIST ON LOŠINJ/ ARCHDUKE 9. CHARLES STEPHEN

The first tourist in Veli Lošinj was the Archduke Charles Stephen of Austria. His great love for sailing and frail health brought him here in 1885, and after his first visit he decided to cast anchor in this beautiful seaside town where he spent his winters for the next 30 years. Half of the Viennese court followed suit.

#### FOLK COSTUME OF SUSAK

The ceremonial folk costume of Susak was not originally as short and fluorescent as we know it today. It changed in the early 20th century due to the influence of fashion and taste of locals who emigrated to the US. Regardless, it continues to fascinate with many starchy underskirts and shiny decorations.



### 20. BELLOWS AND ACCORDION

The traditional musical instrument of the villages on Lošinj is bellows made of sheep's skin. Its penetrating, historic sound can still be heard at local festivals, followed by the sound of Lošinj's "urban instrument" – the accordion. Waltz and polka are indispensable dances during the carnival festivities.
